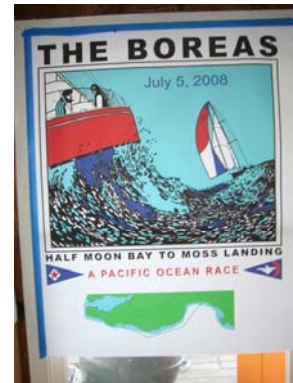
SAILING SUNDAY, TRULY

For the OYRA race, 23 boats competed in 5 classes. We sent the racers on courses of 28.5 and 32 NM, heading straight out the Golden Gate and around navigation buoys, before turning south down the coast to Pillar Point Harbor. Winds were light from the south, and all but 2 boats finished, albeit with very few spinnakers during the race.

MORE ADVENTURE ABOARD GINGI



We left Bora Bora on June 14th planning to go to Suvarrow in the Cook Islands, about 690 miles. After studying the weather patterns, it looked like the best choice was to take the worst weather conditions at the beginning of our trip so that the end of the trip would be more comfortable. That meant big swell and lots of wind. Two other boats left Bora Bora a few hours behind us. Well, the swell was big but about sixteen seconds apart so it wasn't too bad. On the morning of Day 2, after we had made 140 miles, there was a loud clunk and the helm stopped responding and the boat started spinning around. We realized that the cable to the steering had snapped. The wind was blowing hard and we were bouncing around. That meant no autopilot, no control and we had about five more days to go. After the initial panic wore off, we connected our inside steering (yes, that's the good thing about having a pilot house boat). Amanda took the helm down below in the stifling heat. John dug out our emergency tiller (that we never thought we'd ever have to use) and connected it in the cockpit. By this time, Amanda was seasick and very relieved to know that she could go outside! So there we were, finally in control of the boat again, but imagining how it was going to be hand steering with a heavy wooden tiller for the next five days. After an hour or so John experimented with connecting the tiller to the wind vane and he rigged it successfully. With a lot of readjustments, and close attention, we were able to have the setup work for us so we didn't. We decided it was better not to stop at Suvarrow because there are no facilities there and it requires more control than we had with the emergency tiller to enter this small atoll. There is only the caretaker and his family living there and we thought it prudent to continue to Pago Pago (pronounced Pango Pango), American Samoa – a total of 1103 miles from Bora Bora. After about five days, the seas had calmed down and the wind died and we actually had to motor.

We were able to sail with the spinnaker for a while. On Day 10, the weather changed again and in the next few hours we had 25-knot winds and huge squalls with heavy rain. We only had about fifty miles to go. Our final night at sea we had to steer with the tiller as we were caught in a storm for several hours. The sight of American Samoa (the island of Tutuila) on the horizon was wonderful to behold. We finally arrived in the safety of Pago Pago harbor on at 10 a.m. on our eleventh day at sea. We called the Port officials on VHF radio and they told us to tie up at the Customs dock. We were met by three officials with wonderful smiles and welcomes. After completing the relevant paperwork we anchored, showered, put clean sheets on the bed and went to sleep. We were awoken several hours later by the strangest and most unpleasant aromas wafting in through the hatches. The source was two tuna canneries, one of which is Starkist, which dominate the north shore of the harbor! Luckily the unpleasant whiffs don't last more than a few minutes and are few and far between! However, the harbor is in a stunning setting, overlooked by Rainmaker Mountain which traps the rain clouds and gives Pago Pago Harbor the highest annual rainfall of any harbor in the world. And if you hold your breath you can forget about the canneries!

The following morning we went ashore. Everyone we see on the streets here has lovely smiles and welcoming attitudes. People will drop what they are doing to help you. Many men wear the traditional island dress – lava lavas (sarongs) and white shirts. John had the broken stainless steel cable with him and we went to the first hardware store that we saw. They didn't have it so the salesman made phone calls to different businesses around the island to see if he could locate what we needed. Unfortunately, nobody stocks it. We then returned to the boat and stopped by a Canadian boat that is anchored close to us. The owner, John, said he may have the cable we were looking for! After two minutes of searching, he came out with exactly what we needed!! So John has been able to fix our steering problem. Amazing. When we were at the hardware store, Amanda had complimented one of the sales girls on the pretty fabric flower she was wearing behind her ear. Later in the day, we returned to the store and she gave the flower to Amanda. This will be a hard island to leave because of the lovely people.

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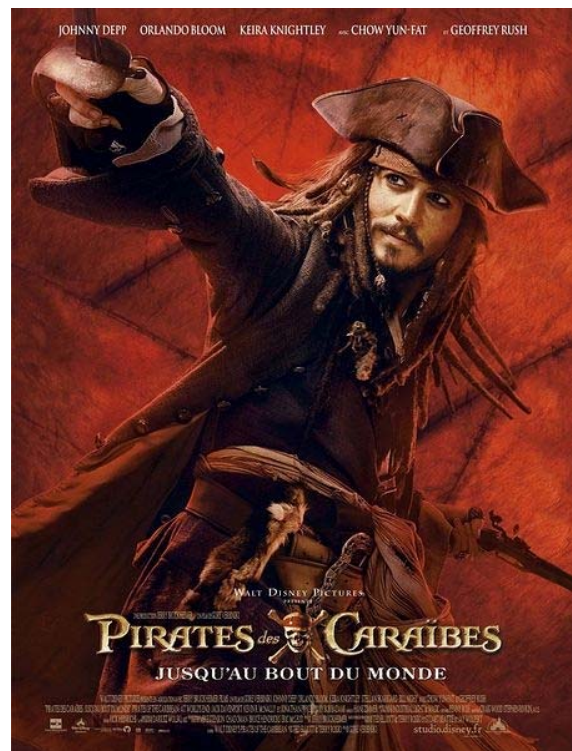
